

Task	Task	Support	How long should I take?
1	Follow the link and read the step by step guide on writing your own script. (pages 6-8) <a href="https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/guides/zawycdm/revision/6">https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/guides/zawycdm/revision/6</a>	A script consists of dialogue (what the characters say to each other), stage directions and instructions to the actors and director.	10 to 15 minutes.
2	Now write your own monologue that is about living in quarantine. Create another character that is living on the cruise ship during this time. We challenge you to include one of these (or more) in your monologue:  A missing watch A nurse with an empty stomach An expired prescription A marriage proposal A reformed thief An exit strategy An unusual smell A plea for forgiveness	Use the script provided in last weeks lesson to give you ideas on how to write it.	45 to 60 minutes
3	To develop this further you should begin to continue the script into your own play. The monologue you have just wrote will either start your play or come half way through or the end. You are the playwright so you can decide!	First think of the storyline, then create the characters, then begin the dialogue between characters.  Don't forget: The stage directions should be in brackets and will tell the actors exactly what to do or how to say the line.  For example (Mrs Stephens sits at her kitchen table with her hand under her chin.)  Mrs Stephens- (excitedly) I can't wait to see all my students.	60 minutes to 120 minutes
