Chihiro leaves her parents to explore the theme park and it is during this time that she not only comes across the bath house that is at the end of the bridge, but she is introduced to Haku.

It is during this introduction that we are able to understand the difference in the costumes that Chihiro and Haku are wearing. Whilst Chihiro is attired in a modern white and green striped t-shirt, pink shorts and trainers, Haku is dressed in a traditional white, blue and pink, Japanese clothing called Happi.

Perhaps Miyazaki arranged this meeting on a bridge to signify the meeting or the 'bridging' of modern and traditional Japan, as later we learn that Chihiro and Haku become allies in saving Chihiro's parents. This is further reinforced as we see the traditional Japanese concepts (Kami), used by Haku, to delay the incoming spirits to aid Chihiro's escape. In Japan, it was traditionally expected that children develop a sense of Bushido. Haku shows Bushido - which speaks of loyalty, courage, humility and respect — in protecting Chihiro from the spirits. It is clear that as a modern Japanese child, Chihiro does not understand some of the traditions and responds as expected by running away. Despite these two characters being Japanese, Miyazaki shows them to be from two different worlds, possibly a reflection of Japan today.

The intended effect on the audience is to understand how the traditions of Japan have been somewhat forgotten by the youth. Young Japanese children, like Chihiro, have become disconnected from their past replacing it with the modern technology and ideas. The audience begins to see the importance of blending the traditions of Japan with modern living in order to be successful.
