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The History of Popular Music

The origins of pop music can be found in a variety of different musical styles, including the jazzy piano melodies of **ragtime**, a musical trend associated with the late 19th to early 20th centuries. Its roots can also be found in improvised rhythms of the **jazz era** of the 1920s and 1930s and the orchestras of the **big band era**, which ruled in the 1940s. In the 1950s and 1960s, a new type of music emerged. This new genre of music was called **rock and roll** and was characterized by fast rhythms, strong beats, and soulful lyrics. **Elvis Presley** was the "King of Rock and Roll" and was one of the first artists to popularize this new genre. Presley's popularity was matched by another rock and roll act known as **the Beatles**, who were a part of the British music invasion, and **the Beach Boys**, who surfed into the mix with their musical representation of Southern California culture.

Levels of response
