HEAD OF SCHOOL UPDATE



Welcome to a bumper, two-page edition of the weekly newsletter, which marks the halfway point through academic year 2019 - 20!

It is unusual to start our weekly address by discussing events of the weekend, but many of you will know that twice over the weekend, we suffered power cuts in the local area. Our heroes, Mr. Evans and Mr. Davis, attended the site immediately, during

their weekend, to ensure that the site was secure, and to attend to the security company. I am sure you agree that they have gone above and beyond even the highest calls of duty, and I wish to start this week's address by thanking them. Both Mr. Evans and Mr. Davis will be on site during the half-term break, with our other wonderful colleague on the Site Team, Ms. Dawson, using her well -earned break to tour around various universities with her son. This week saw one of the jewels in the calendar at Langley – Ethos Week. This week, where the traditional timetable is collapsed, allows us to give our students vital learning in key areas (such as PSHE, British Values, Citizenship, Leadership and more), as well as offer unique opportunities. Before I attempt to reel off what has happened this week, I must thank some key staff for their work in preparing this week. Our Vice Principal, Mr. Gee, has coordinated the whole week; he has been working on this for months, and even by our lofty standards, this has been, by far, the smoothest and slickest Ethos Week we have ever had, a testament to his exceptional work. In addition, each of our PLDs - Mrs. Fogarty, Mrs. Goodman, Mr. Alexander and Mr. Snell - have worked tirelessly organising activities for their year groups, as well as orchestrating their teams. Finally, Ethos Week is a time when we offer all students the chance for an external visit. All visits have been put together with Miss Goodbourn, our external visits supremo! Her organisation, communication and composure, during such a strenuous week, has been incredible to behold. Thank you all so much!

In terms of Ethos Week, I will try to provide a potted tour of what our children have been up to. In Year 7, students visited Birmingham City Centre, taking in key cultural sites. We were hosted for the day by James and Martha at Gas Street Church; their hospitality and kindness, as they received their largest school party since their opening, was lovely. Our offer for Family Lunch, in reciprocation for their generosity, is always open to them. Also, our Chair of Governors, Mr. Pope, was able to make a flying visit, a real treat for our lucky students. Year 8 students visited the Black Country Living Museum, where I was pleased to hear that the students were equally as interested in the historical information as they were the (superb) fish and chips! During the week, Year 7 and 8 students have also been working towards their SSAT Leadership Accreditation, meaning they will all receive an

additional accolade, to add to their C.Vs as they grow older!

In Year 9, there has been a real drive to support students where they need it, with sessions focusing on Citizenship, and key lessons regarding health and well-being. In addition, a visit to Cannock Chase provided some key cultural capital for our students. In Year 10, students completed an English Literature mock question, engaged in STEM activities with the Army, and have all visited a Russell Group university. As you can see, there was an extraordinary provision for our students; we thank you for making the voluntary £5 contribution, as transport and booking costs for the week certainly add up!

At Langley, we see ourselves as committed partners to the local community. Our attendance and participation at Sandwell Network events is excellent; the work we do with primary schools in the local area means our students have a seamless transition; we have welcomed visitors from local schools to see how we do things, and provide feedback, which has made us all stronger. We appreciate that the challenge of education in Sandwell (and the broader Black Country) will only be truly solved when we work together (and that each school has its own limitations and inhibiting factors) – though we might do things differently to other schools, we have always been happy to articulate our vision and rationale, and listen to others.

Therefore, it was very discouraging this week to learn, from the parents of our Head Boy, Ben, that a parent of a child at another school had written about us on the Facebook page of another school, in quite a disparaging manner. The irony of the post, which was connected to the justified celebration of their pleasing progress, was that we have not had a full set of results, so cannot appear in any league tables. Though this was inaccurate, yet intended to discredit us, it was equally disrespectful to our sister site, Q3 Great Barr, who are top of the Sandwell table for Attainment (as well as other measures), reflective of the hard work of the staff team, leadership and stewardship of our friend, Mr. Arnull. Additionally, it seemed that, where we should be celebrating the success of our neighbours, and seeking to learn together, this person did not want to focus on the successes of their child's school, but try to denigrate us!

There are so many ways to look at performance and data; we will appear on the league tables in 2021, and will fairly look at where we perform on a local, regional and national level. So much of what we do to help young people in schools will not appear on such measures – the happiness and health of our children, their communication skill and character, and so much more. I could not be prouder of our students, our parents (who were quick to remind this poster of the invalidity of their comment) and our staff team, who all work together to improve the outcomes and prospects of our children. Whatever the tables say, I will continue to be the proudest Head of School I could be...
